

Announcing Virginia's 2019 Letters About Literature Winners *Annual Student Writing Competition Honors Young Writers Across the Commonwealth*

April 15, 2019—Charlottesville, Va.—**The Virginia Center for the Book**—a program of Virginia Humanities—announced the 2019 winners and honorable mentions of the **state-wide Letters About Literature writing competition** for students in grades 4-12. Now in its 26th year, the contest **encourages to read a book, poem, or speech and write to that author** about how the book affected them.

During the 25th anniversary **Virginia Festival of the Book** in March, the Virginia Center for the Book honored the following 2019 Letters About Literature winners and honorable mentions. The Letters About Literature Celebration—held Saturday, March 23, 2019, at the Jefferson-Madison Regional Library in Charlottesville—featured student readings and awards, as well as **honorary guest speakers Robbi Behr and Matthew Swanson**, the author-illustrator creators of *The Real McCoys*; *Everywhere, Wonder*, and other award-winning books for young readers.

Out of hundreds of entries received from across Virginia, the selected state-wide winners are:
